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Flintlock & Percussion Pistols

A GOOD .65" FLINTLOCK PATTERN 1799 LIGHT DRAGOON MARKED TO THE III LIGHT DRAGOONS, KINGS GERMAN LEGION, with 9" barrel bearing the kings proofs, flat style borderline engraved lock, stamped with the 'TOWER' cypher on the tail and the crown G.R. cypher to the centre and struck with small crown arrow government ownership mark, fitted with ring-neck cock, regulation brass mounted full walnut stock the . The buttcap lobe engraved "III L.D. K.G.L / C .18", 3rd Light Dragoons Kings German Legion, C troop gun No 18. The Pattern 1799 Light Dragoon was a war time expedient, its departure from the preceding Pattern 1759 Elliot L.D. and 1794 L.D pistols was a slight lowering in quality and the fitting of a flat lock modelled on the East India Company's flat Pattern 1778 pistol lock. Pistols of this type were extensively issued during the Napoleonic Wars but the design was quickly overtaken by the various pattern of New Land with swivel rammer, consequently today examples are not so common.

This pistol is a very important collectors item as it is marked to the Kings German Legion one of the most famous and hard fighting of all units during the Napoleonic Wars. The King's German Legion was formed from King George III's exiled Hanoverian subjects (the King was also the Elector of Hanover) in 1803. After the French occupation of Hanover many former Hanoverian officers and soldiers fled the French occupation of Hanover to Britain. It was from these that the K.G.L. was formed and approved by the King in Dec. 1803. The legion eventually grew in size to include 10-line battalions, two rifle regts. Five cavalry regts and artillery, around 14,000 men in total. The 3rd L.D. K.G.L. were part of the mounted contingent and an elite unit, recognized for high discipline and efficiency, with an unsurpassed list of battle honours including Northern Germany (1804–1805). Baltic Area & Copenhagen (1807). Walcheren Expedition (1809). Peninsular War (1808–1814) including Battle of Salamanca (1812). Battle of Waterloo (1815). At Waterloo the 3rd K.G.L Hussars formed part of the 7th Cavalry Brigade and were very active in the battle, with their C.O. Lt. Col. F. L. Meyer being killed together with 136 others. The pistol is in very good condition with sharp stock, small, repaired crack below leading edge of lock, and small chip to top left forend, barrel to a grey/brown patina some minor speckling. **An attractive and important collectors pistol marked to an elite unit with numerous battle honours** **£1295**





A GOOD .65" FLINTLOCK NEW LAND SERVICE PISTOL CIRCA 1805, MARKED TO THE 18th HUSSARS, 9" barrel with baluster turned breech and stamped with the kings proofs, swivel rammer hinged at muzzle, fitted with improved small size Paget lock with stepped tail, bolt safety, raised semi-waterproof pan, the centre stamped with the Crown G.R. cypher, regulation brass mounted full walnut stock, the trigger-guard bow engraved "18th L. D. the forend fitted with typical brass reinforce. The New Land pistol was one of the new series of weapons being developed for army issue from about 1802, the series includes the New Land Infantry musket, the New Land Light Infantry musket and the New Land Sergeants fusil or carbine and the Light Cavalry New Land pistol. At least 10 variations of the New Land pistol can be encountered the main difference being to the type of lock fitted, other minor differences include aprons around the barrel tang and pinned not keyed barrels which might be indicative of conversion from the earlier Pattern 1799 pistol. The New Land appears to have been first issued to Light Cavalry regiments serving in the Peninsula and also to those who fought at Waterloo. This pistol was issued to the 18th Light Dragoons probably around 1805 when the regiment was retitled the 18th (Kings Irish) Regiment of Light Dragoons, in honour of King George III. The regiment served in the Peninsular 1808-14, it fought at Sahagun (1808), Beavente (1808), Coruna (1809) Burgos (1812), Morales (1813), Vitoria (1813), Orthes (1814) and Toulouse (1814). The following year it charged at Waterloo and after joined the Army of Occupation, in 1821 the regiment was disbanded and not reinstated until 1859. In very good condition, the stock with showing some wear commensurate with use, brass strip repair to forend, which is typical of these pistols, barrel and lock to a steel grey patina. A GOOD .56" PATTERN 1801 LONG SEA SERVICE FLINTLOCK PISTOL OF THE NAPOLEONIC WARS, with 12" barrel stamped with the Kings proofs at breech, borderline engraved flat style lock bearing the standard Tower, Crown G.R, cypher, and fitted with a borderline engraved ring-neck cock. Figured full walnut stock profusely Ordnance marked and with raised apron around the barrel tang, the grip with storekeepers stamp dated 1800, fitted with regulation brass mounts including short lobed skull crusher buttcap, long steel belt hook fitted on the pistols left side. Some authorities refer to this pistols as a Pattern 1716/1801 due to the fact its design had changed little from that of the Pattern 1716. It is a little heavier and more robust in the stock especially in the grip and fore stock, the other and most notable change is in the fitting of the India Pattern pistol lock as used on the Pattern 1799 Light Dragoon pistol, with its borderline engraving and frizzen bridle. This pattern of pistol was introduced at the height for the French wars, it has been recorded that approx. 55,600 were produced in the eleven years 1801 to 1812 when production ceased. Quantities of pistols of this type were sold off by the Tower in the 1960's in groups of three, many of which had never been issued. This example in very good plus condition with excellent woodwork, plugged hole in butt for securing to a wall display, probably at the Tower, barrel to a steel grey finish. A superior example of a pistol of Nelsons navy during the Napoleonic Wars. £1895.



A GOOD .75" PATTERN 1796 HEAVY DRAGOON FLINTLOCK SERVICE PISTOL, with 9" barrel struck with the Kings proofs at the breech, the borderline engraved Pattern 1777 lock of rounded form engraved 'TOWER' on the tail and bearing the Crown G.R. cypher to the centre together with the crown arrow Ordnance inspection stamp, fitted with its correct style swan-neck cock, regulation brass mounted full walnut stock, bag shaped grip, brass mounts including trigger-guard, 'S' shaped sideplate and the distinctive double rammer pipe with spring to hold its original steel rammer. This pattern of pistol is correctly termed the Modified Pattern 1796 Heavy Dragoon pistol, the original had the Nock screwless lock, which was found to be expensive and slow to manufacture hence a modified pattern produced and fitted with the Government 1777 rounded pistol lock and with the introduction of a special cast double throat pipe which includes a rammer retaining spring. This pattern of pistol was specially produced for issue to all heavy cavalry regiments who carried them during and after the Napoleonic wars. **In very good plus condition with excellent sharp stock, the barrel to a pleasing grey / brown patina, chip to tip of left forend. A better than average example of a rare sought after and historic pistol.** **£795**





AN INTERESTING .75" PATTERN 1796 HEAVY DRAGOON FLINTLOCK SERVICE PISTOL BY KETLAND, with 9" barrel, the borderline engraved Pattern 1777, lock of rounded form engraved 'KETLAND' on the tail and bearing the Crown G.R. cypher to the centre together with A crown/3, this is the mark of an E.I.C. inspector, fitted with its correct style swan-neck cock, regulation brass mounted full walnut stock, bag shaped grip, brass mounts including trigger-guard, 'S' shaped sideplate and the distinctive double rammer pipe with spring to hold its original steel rammer. This pistol was produced for government service by Ketland & Co during the late 1790's at a time of emergency when arms were urgently required and normal purchase and manufacturing procedures of the Ordnance system, temporarily in abeyance, and the trade asked to supply what it could as complete arms. also E.I.C. inspectors conscripted to assist in acceptance inspections. **In very good condition with excellent stock, barrel and lock to a steel grey patina, a rare and interesting variation for the serious collector.** **£850**





A GOOD .65" EAST INDIA COMPANY NEW LAND PATTERN 1811-18 FLINTLOCK PISTOL, 9" barrel struck with London proofs and EIC inspection stamps at breech, swivel rammer with EIC pattern long stirrup loading lever hinged at muzzle. Borderline engraved flat style lock, the centre stamped with the rampant lion EIC cypher together with a small crown over 2 inspection stamp, dated 1815 on the tail, regulation brass mounted full walnut stock. This pattern of pistol was produced 1811 to 1818, the early models were fitted with locks with the standard pan and those made from 1813 had raised or semi-waterproof pans, such as this example. The pattern is an upgrade of the earlier 1808 pistol by the fitting of a swivel rammer with an unusual style of long Y shaped stirrup (apparently designed by Ezekiel Baker). This pattern of pistol closely followed the British service New Land pistol except for the style of rammer. Examples will be found dated 1812 to 1818. In India, Pistols of this pattern were issued to all E.I.C regular cavalry some irregular cavalry regiments and artillery units and some Royal Service cavalry regiments serving in India. They remained in use for many years after they were superseded by the Bakers pattern pistol in 1819 and would have seen service and action in all campaigns from 1813 to the 1830's and possibly even later. A RARE .65" WILLIAM IV NEW LAND LIGHT DRAGOON FLINTLOCK SERVICE PISTOL 9" barrel the breech stamped with Ordnance proofs, swivel rammer hinged to muzzle. Flat style borderline engraved lockplate, stamped in centre with Crown W.R. 4th cypher, stepped and rounded tail, sliding bolt safety and raised semi-waterproof pan. William 4th reigned from 1830 to 1837 a relatively short period, arms bearing his cypher are exceptionally rare. Regulation brass mounted full walnut stock, the butt fitted with the new style domed cap. The William IV New Land Pistol was made in limited quantities and is quite rare, it features a few differences over the earlier patterns including the lock, the domed buttcap and the rammer channel being cut back further and the fitting of a brass rammer entry pipe. **In very good genuine condition with good stock, barrel to a steel grey patina, a good and rare pistol for the serious collector.** **£995**



A RARE & GOOD .65" HANOVERIAN PATTERN 1806/43 OR 1ST TYPE NEW LAND PATTERN PISTOL CONVERTED TO PERCUSSION, with 9" barrel struck with both the Kings Crown G.R. proofs and Birmingham commercial post 1813 proofs, fitted with swivel rammer hinged at muzzle, flat style lock stamped "TOWER" on the tail and crown G.R. to the centre fitted with heavy Germanic style percussion hammer and having an interesting form of safety cross bolt, regulation brass mounted full walnut stock, with carved apron around the barrel tang, the sideplate engraved with the regimental markings "G.D.C. D.356", the forend fitted with a brass strengthener. This pistol was originally a 1st Type New Land pistol, made around 1806 and probably issued to the Kings German Legion. King George III was also King of Hanover, on the outbreak of the Napoleonic Wars and the French invasion of Hanover in 1803, many Hanoverians fled to Britain and the Kings German Legion was formed, this became one of the best known and highly regarded fighting forces under British command during the Napoleonic Wars. On the cessation of hostilities and the liberation of Hanover, George III regained his title as King or Elector of Hanover. the Hanoverian army was reformed which included many men from the KGL and their arms with other arms being supplied from British store. Pistols of this type were converted to percussion in the early 1840's and declared obsolete in 1866. The kings of Britain continued to be rulers of Hanover until 1837 when Victoria came to the throne, under salic law a woman could not become the ruling monarch of Hanover. The throne passed to her uncle the Duke of Cumberland, the Kingdom of Hanover ended in 1866 when it was annexed by Prussia. In excellent untouched condition with very crisp stock, barrel covered in old preservative lacquer, a fine collector's item, possibly from the display at Marienburg castle, the contents of which were sold by Sotheby's in 2005. A GOOD 32-BORE PERCUSSION TRAVELLING PISTOL BY WATERHOUSE & HORTON CIRCA 1830, with 6.75" sighted octagonal browned Damascus barrel, the tang and breech decorated with foliate scroll engraving, the lock with attractively decorated with quality borderline and scroll engraving and signed "WATERHOUSE & HORTON", to the centre, flat style dolphin head cock engraved to match. full walnut stock with chequered wooden grip, border and scroll engraved steel mounts, horn-topped wooden ramrod. The makers Waterhouse & Horton were established at 32 Edmund St, Birmingham 1820 to 1832 making this a very early percussion pistol. An excellent piece with fine untouched stock, the barrel with a fine browned finish. (6/25) £495

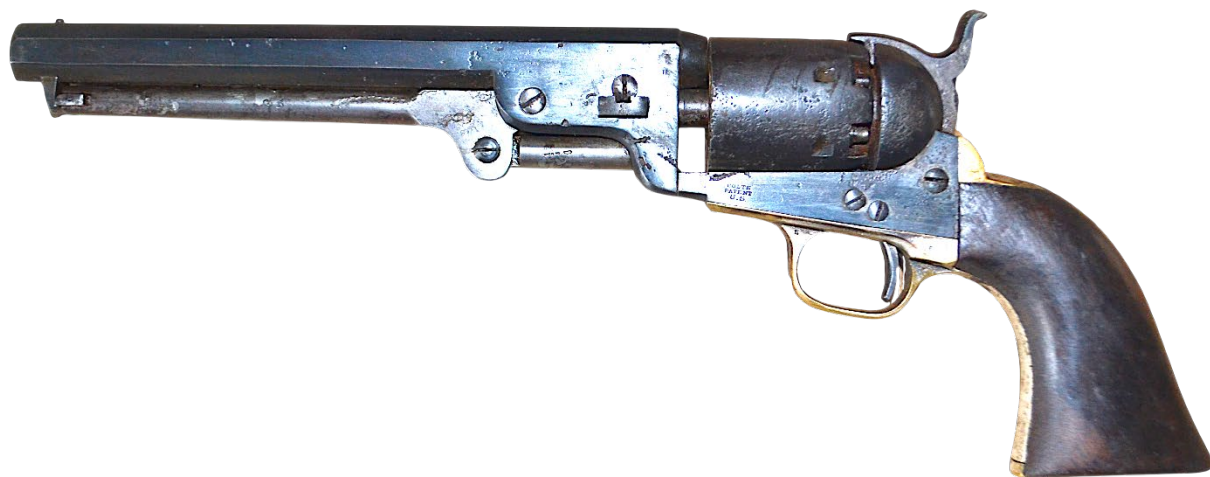


A .65" EAST INDIA COMPANY PATTERN 1843 PERCUSSION TROOPERS PISTOL DATED FOR 1844. 9" London proofed barrel, with H coded date stamp for 1844/45, with swivel rammer hinged at muzzle, borderline engraved side-action lock engraved with the E.I.C. rampant lion cypher to the centre, full brass mounted walnut stock, the left-side stamped with various issue markings, heavy flat butt-cap with lanyard ring, This big solider proof and practical pistol was made for issue to E.I.C cavalry and horse artillery in the 1840's seeing action and use in all major campaigns into the 1860's, including the Sikh wars, Indian Mutiny and the numerous minor campaigns. As well as being issued to E.I.C. Cavalry and Horse Artillery some were also issued to Imperial regiments that served in India. Approximately 18,145 were produced between 1843 and 1852, the majority were issued to the Bengal army with a smaller quantity issued to the Bombay Presidency army, none were issued in Madras. **In very good condition with good sharp stock, barrel to a blue / grey patina, a good and above average specimen of a very historic pistol.** **£695**

A RARE .36" U.S. MARTIAL COLT MODEL 1851 NAVY PERCUSSION REVOLVER CIRCA 1857, 9" octagonal barrel the top flat stamped with the Colt Hartford address, six shot cylinder etched with the naval engagement scene, open top frame the left-side stamped "Colts Patent" over "U.S." indicating purchase by the U.S. military in 1857, one piece walnut grips, all matching numbers in the 78,1XX serial range, dating 1857. Between 1855 and 1858 the U.S. Army purchased approx.. 16,750 Colt Navy and this was one. In good condition fairly sharp overall, with approx.. 50% cylinder scene, good clear barrel address and frame markings some patches of pitting, recoloured overall, good action. A .44" CIVIL WAR COLT MODEL 1860 ARMY PERCUSSION REVOLVER CIRCA 1862, 8" round barrel, Colt Address legend to top, creep rammer, 6 shot rebated cylinder with some scene, one-piece walnut grips with faint cartouche. The Colt Model 1860 was the major revolver in use by northern forces during the Civil War the government purchased almost the entire production. They also saw service in the West in the Indian wars, large quantities were sold off as surplus many going west with farmers, settlers, prospectors, and cowboys. This example supplied to the U. S. military in 1862 almost at the beginning of the Civil War must surely have been issued and seen action. Due to long hard usage good examples are hard to find, **In good condition with matching numbers, clear barrel address., some areas of pitting and wear to recoloured metalwork, some wear to grips commensurate with use. Colt Army's have been increasing in value and becoming hard to find.**

Contained in its green baize lined and partitioned oak case, the lid with correct Deane Adams & Deane label, accessories include flask, mould turnscrew, nipple key, oil bottle and wad punch, all in very good condition the case with solid partitions. LONDON BRIDGE", 5-shot cylinder with decorated leading edge, foliate engraved frame marked "ADAMS PATENT No 9893R", indicating manufacture 1853/54, 5 shot cylinder, with decorated band to leading edge, one piece chequered walnut grips, flared pommel fitted with a dished butt-cap and hinged trap. Revolvers of this type were purchased by officers destined for the Crimea and this example dates perfectly for that campaign. In very good condition with excellent grips having sharp chequering, barrel and action with much original deep blue finish.

A GOOD, RARE & EARLY 54 BORE BRAZIER MODEL 1851 ADAMS SELF COCKING REVOLVER, CIRCA 1852, with 6 ½" octagonal barrel, fitted with adjustable dovetailed blade foresight, the top-strap signed "JOSEPH BRAZIER & SON, WOLVERHAMPTON", and fitted with dovetailed Vee type rear-sight, solid borderline engraved frame inscribed "ADAMS PATENT No 30,555 B", the grip under-strap stamped with the No 3042. Plain five shot cylinder, one piece chequered walnut grips with domed buttcap encompassing a percussion cap compartment with hinged lid. This rare revolver was made under licence by Joseph Braizier, how, or why Brazier became licensees under Adams 1851 patent is not known, but Brazier apparently made both the patented frame for supply to Robert Adams for setting up and finishing as well as a limited number of complete revolvers of which this is one. Adams revolvers made by Brazier can be identified by the B for Brazier, suffixed serial number. It is unknow how many Adams revolvers the firm made, certainly less than 500, some known specimens are, Nos 30,245B, 30,327B, 30,552B, 30,839B, 30,849B and in 120 Bore Nos 30,422B, 30,441B. These Brazier Adams revolvers were sometimes fitted with Braziers patent lever rammer; the firm also produced a double action version of the Adams self cocking pistol which was also fitted with the Brazier patent rammer. The firm of Joseph Brazier of The Ashes, Wolverhampton were in operation 1827 to 1900 and were one of the West Midlands largest manufacturers to the trade of gun locks and actions, as well as gun parts, forgings, tools and implements, They exhibited at the Great Exhibition in 1851, where they were awarded a medal for the quality of their work. Revolvers of this type were popular with officers posted to the Crimea, in very good condition with excellent grips, barrel and action with fading finish, good action and bore. (120/25) £995





A GOOD 54 BORE TRANTER 2ND MODEL DOUBLE TRIGGER PERCUSSION REVOLVER BY E. & W BOND, with 6 ¼" octagonal barrel, the top flat engraved with retailers name "E & W. BOND, 142 LEADENHALL ST. LONDON"., borderline and foliate engraved frame with the serial No 3,721 T, dating 1856, the leftside fitted with Tranters 2nd Model loading lever, marked Tranters Patent. The Tranter 2nd Model is a fairly rare Tranter variation as it was soon superseded by the 3rd Model double trigger revolver and the 4th Model single trigger revolver patented in 1856. Its most noticeable feature was its detachable loading lever; the 3rd Model had a different shape of rammer that was permanently attached to the gun and the 4th model was of course a double action single trigger revolver but had the same loading lever as the 3rd Model. It is estimated that substantially less than 1,000 2nd models were produced. In very good overall condition, with excellent grips, barrel and action with much deep original blue. LANCASTER 151 NEW BOND St. LONDON", fitted with Tranter's patent loading lever on the left, borderline and foliate engraved frame stamped "TRANTER'S / PATENT" in an oval on the left and "No 8351 T" on the right, dating the revolver to circa 1858/59, fitted with pivoting hook safety catch and S shaped spring arbour retaining pin, five shot cylinder with the usual roped band decoration to leading edge. One piece chequered walnut grips with domed, scroll engraved buttcap. An above average specimen with most original deep blue finish and excellent grips. (138/25) **£995**



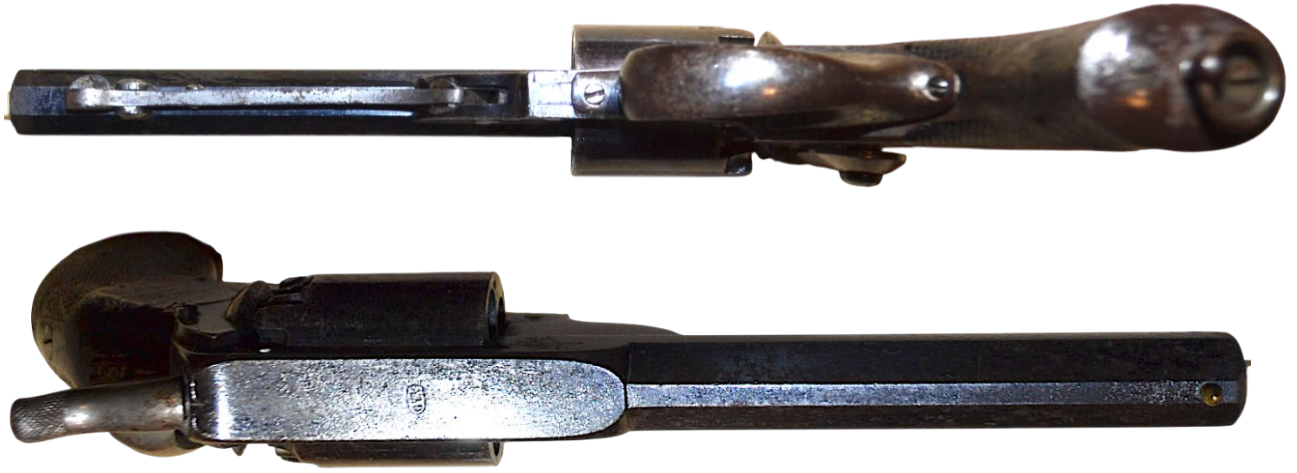
AN 80 BORE (.38") TRANTER FOURTH MODEL SINGLE TRIGGER DOUBLE ACTION REVOLVER RETAILED BY JOHN HAYTON OF GRAHAM'S TOWN, EASTERN CAPE, with 4 ½" octagonal barrel the top strap engraved with the retailers name, 'JOHN HAYTON GRAHAMS TOWN', foliate engraved frame bearing the Tranter serial No. 15,687, circa 1859, pivoting hook safety and S shaped spring and stud cylinder arbour release, (stud replaced) , five shot cylinder with rope band decoration to leading edge, one piece chequered walnut grips. In very good condition with good grips, some minor wear commensurate with use, barrel and action with some original fading blue finish, good action and bore, Tranter revolvers in 80 bore are quite rare, a good collectors specimen. £750



A RARE 54 BORE SPANISH MODEL 1862 NAVAL CONTRACT KERR'S PATENT SINGLE ACTION PERCUSSION REVOLVER, with 6" octagonal barrel the top strap stamped with an "A. O" in an oval and an anchor in-between, borderline engraved backaction lock also stamped with the "A.O" anchor cypher, 5 shot cylinder stamped with a "C" anchor inspection mark, the two piece frame with some foliate engraving and bearing the serial No 2868, one piece chequered walnut grips, domed iron buttcap with lanyard ring. In February 1862 the Spanish naval authorities decided to adopt the Kerr revolver, an interesting decision as previously they had purchased quantities of Model 1858 LeFauchaux pinfire revolvers. The order for 4000 Kerr revolvers was placed with Real Fábrica de Placencia in the Basque region and subcontracted to gunsmiths of the Guipuzcoa guild, who would deliver them for inspection and acceptance. In 1864 with production well underway and partial issues made, certain defects with the mechanism came to light, forcing their withdrawal

from service in order to be refurbished. This led to a new upgraded Kerr revolver being approved, this was the Model 1864. The manufacture of the Model 1864 was contracted to two private companies under the supervision of naval officers, 4,000 revolvers from Orbea Hermanos of Eibar, and a further 1,500 from Fabrica de Durango. The Kerr model of 1862 bears only the serial number and the A-anchor-O inspection mark, while The Kerr model 1864 bears the serial number the naval markings and either, Orbea Herms. Eibar or Fabrica De Durango. Both models were projected a service lifespan of 10 years, but by early 1869 it was decided the Kerr revolver was a failure and not fit for purpose, all the Model 1862 revolvers were withdrawn from service, and the service period of the Model 1864 reduced to 7 years and replaced with the Army's regulation LeFauchaux. Then in 1870 a naval artillery officer designed a way of using the withdrawn Kerr's by transforming them to use centrefire metallic cartridges becoming the Model 1870 Kerr revolver. It is unknown how many were converted as in 1872 the country erupted into civil war (Third Carlist war 1872-76). **This example in near excellent condition with much original blue and good grips.**

EN. EIBAR ANO 1872", with side mounted cartridge ejector rod, undermounted 4 ½" flat bladed spring bayonet, six shot cylinder with gold inlay decoration, open top frame, decorated to match the cylinder and barrel, folding trigger, two piece chequered walnut grips with lanyard ring. AN INTERESTING & RARE .30" RIMFIRE WEBLEY SINGLE ACTION POCKET REVOLVER, with 2.5" octagonal barrel, fitted with side mounted ejector lever and plunger, top strap engraved with retailers name "J. SQUIRES, LONDON", borderline engraved one-piece frame, spur trigger-guard and side mounted loading gate, plain six shot cylinder, two piece chequered walnut grips. Although very similar to Tranters design the pistol was made by P. Webley & Son. In very good condition with excellent sharp grips, barrel and action with fading blued finish. Revolvers of this type and calibre are quite rare. (90/25) £495

Type 2 produced 1843 to 1847 is a copy of the British service Pattern 1843 Victoria carbine, with a rounded scroll trigger-guard and flat noscap incorporating a rammer pipe. Type 3 produced 1851 was a heavier stock, a Brunswick style trigger-guard, a standard noscap with a separate longer rammer pipe set back 2 ½" from the muzzle. Type 2 carbines were supplied as follows:- 1,200 in May 1843, 1,400 in May 1844, 2,200 in May 1845, 200 in August 1847, giving a total of 5,800 of which 5400 were issued in Bengal and just 400 in Madras.

Records state they were issued to the 3rd Light Dragoons who used them during both the 1st and 2nd Sikh Wars 1845-46 and 1848-48, and the 14th Light Dragoons who used them during the 2nd Sikh War. The bulk were issued to Bengal Light Cavalry regiments, certainly the 1st, 3rd 4th 6th 7th, 8th and 11th regiments B.L.C. carried them and would have used them during the Sikh wars. This example is dated for the shipping year 1843 to 1844 consequently one of the first supplied and might well have been issued to the 3rd L.D. who were rearmed with carbines of this pattern in 1845 or the 14th L.D. in 1845/46. Even if issued to one of the Bengal Native cavalry regiments it could have seen action during both the 1st and 2nd Sikh wars. Victoria carbines were not liked by the native cavalry units, being considered too long and heavy. Many like this one were modified by removing the side rib and ring for issue to the Bengal Artillery, at a rate of 19 per battery. I am sure this weapon has had an interesting life, first issued to a cavalry regiment in India, possibly seeing action during one or both of the Sikh wars. Then refurbished for issue to the Bengal Artillery. It would have seen service during the mutiny much of the Bengal Artillery remained loyal. When outdated it would have been returned to store, then it was supplied with a quantity of other arms by the E.I.G. to the Maharajah of Fridacote a Sikh, for issue to his private army It was one of 30 similar carbines I obtained from the armoury of the Maharajah of Fridacote back in 1992. I sold it together with two variant carbines to David Harding and is actually illustrated in his epic Small of the East India Co. Vol. 2. At the time David believed none had survived and the batch I had were the only ones he had seen. The three examples in the National Army Museum, I also supplied. Double dated locks are not unusual on arms made for the East India Government, it would appear that old parts were taken from store and a new dated added on setting up. Regulation brass mounted full walnut stock, butt with feint Enfield roundel. This is one of only 14,000 Pattern 1859 Native Infantry Muskets made at the Royal Small Arms Factory Enfield. Approved by the Ordnance authorities on 7th May 1859 as an improvement on the Pattern 1858 musket, the main difference being the Pattern 1859 has a slightly thicker and heavier barrel; it was found that the thinner and weaker barrel of the Pattern 1858 was liable to bend with bayonet use. Although approved in 1858 no appreciable quantities were produced at the Enfield factory until 1864 and only 14,000 were manufactured. The Pattern 1859 was one of a family of smoothbore Enfield's produced for issue to Sepoy regiments in the East India Governments army. After the mutiny of 1857 it was decided that native regiments be armed with inferior weapons to that of British regulars. This musket made at Enfield to the highest standards of the day, shipped to India and issued to a sepoy regiment in the Bengal army. **This is a rare gun and in very good plus condition with fading blue finish, good bore, good stock with some minor loss of sharpness. Serious black powder shooters consider the Pattern 1859 to be the finest and most accurate of all percussion muskets due to its reduced calibre and it high quality of manufacture, barrel boring and finishing.**

The Enfield Pattern 1853 lock is dated 1863, indicating that the rifle is a conversion from an earlier muzzle loading rifle. Regulation iron mounted walnut stock with inset oval brass disc stamped with the number 32, an old museum or armoury identity number. This rifle probably dates 1865/66 and is an early Braendlin Albini and a conversion, the conversion being effected in a similar manner to the first Snider conversions, the upper part of the barrel has been machined away to act as a receiver and the breech block hinge forged onto the top of the barrel. Later Braendlin Albini's and the Snider utilized a screw on breech shoe unit. This breech-loading system was designed and patented in 1866 by an Italian Naval Captain, Augusto Albini and Francis Augustus Braendlin a Birmingham gunmaker and proprietor of the Mont Strom Gun Works and later the Braendlin Armoury. In fact, the Braendlin Albini is an adaption of the Mont Storm. It features a hinged breech block which is swung up and forward to open, operating a double claw extractor. The firing pin runs through the breech block and is driven by a plunger linked to the hammer which also locks the action closed on firing. The system is far superior to the Snider,

having a positive locked breech and positive levered extraction, it was trialed by the War Department and performed credibly well. It was from those trials that the Martini Henry was adopted, the Braendlin Albine system was adopted by Belgium. **In very good plus condition with excellent untouched stock, barrel with much original blue, tight action and good bore.
